#### The Prime Minister of Uganda in Dubai for the 3rd Uganda-UAE Business Forum

Prime Minister of Uganda, Rt. Hon. Robinah Nabbanja, delivered a Key Note address to a gathering of government officials, diplomats, academics, policymakers and scholars from the UAE and Africa at the Anwar Gargash Diplomatic Academy, Abu Dhabi. The Prime Minister, who attended the 3rd UAE- Uganda Business Forum this week in Abu Dhabi and in Dubai 28th — 30th October 2024 under the theme "Unlocking New Horizons for

Economic Prosperity."

This annual event, organized by the Uganda Embassy in Abu Dhabi and the Uganda Consulate General in Dubai, aims to attract foreign direct investment, promote Uganda's exports to the UAE, encourage tourism, facilitate technology transfers, and mobilize the Ugandan diaspora for development.

Uganda's Prime Minister, Robinah Nabbanja, officially opened the forum on behalf of President Yoweri Kaguta Museveni. In her keynote address, she highlighted the strong bilateral relations between Uganda and the UAE, emphasizing the significant trade and investment partnerships that have developed over the years. She noted that in 2023, Uganda exported goods worth US\$2.03 billion to the UAE, making it Uganda's largest export destination. Additionally, UAE companies have invested over US\$3 billion in Uganda across various sectors, including energy, infrastructure, healthcare, agribusiness, oil and gas, manufacturing, construction, real estate, and tourism.

The forum aligns with several Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), notably: SDG 8: (decent work and economic growth): SDG 9: (industry, innovation, and infrastructure) and SDG 17: (partnerships for the goals).

Prime Minister of Uganda, Rt. Hon. Robinah Nabbanja, delivered a Key Note address to a gathering of government officials, diplomats,

academics, policymakers and scholars from the UAE and Africa at the Anwar Gargash Diplomatic Academy, Abu Dhabi.

The Prime Minister was accompanied to her meetings by Ambassador of the Republic of Uganda to the United Arab Emirates H.E. Zaake Kibedi, Representative of the Permanent Secretary MoFA, Amb. Santa Mary Laker-Kinyera, and Head of Public Diplomacy, Margaret Kafeero.

#### The Prime Minister of Uganda wins prestigious Africa Continental Award



Hon Robinah Nabbanja was announced as a co-winner of the African Female Leader of the Year, a category of the African Leadership Magazine Awards, in recognition of her leadership as Prime Minister of Uganda and her commitment towards driving the Country's socioeconomic development and advancing key national priorities.

Nabbanja who is also the Kakumiro Woman Member of Parliament had been selected by the UK based Non-Governmental Organization 'The African Leadership organization' to compete with three others for the African Female Leader of the year 2024 award where she emerged victorious.

This prestigious continental award, in its various categories, was previously won by President Julius Maada Bio of Sierra Leone, President Lazarus Chakwera of Malawi, former President of Tanzania Jakaya Kikwete, Dr. Akinwumi Adesina, President of the African Development Bank (AFDB), Dr. Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus Director General WHO, Sudanese Businessman Mo Ibrahim, Founder of the Ibrahim Prize for leadership among others.

In September 2024, the Rt. Hon Prime Minister Robinah Nabbanja scooped the Global Women Leadership Award in New York. The Global Women Leadership Award is an annual award conferred by the Centre of Economic and Leadership Development based in the United Kingdom.

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The forum will be officiated by H.E the President of the Republic of Uganda. The forum will gather highlevel officials including the Deputy Secretary General of the United Nations, experts, and key stakeholders from across Africa and beyond, including government ministers, the private sector, civil society, academic institutions, and international organizations.

Preparations for the forum are in high gear. To organize the forum, the political Committee was formed and is chaired by the Rt. Hon Prime Minister, (The members of this committee include the Office of the Prime Minister, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development, Ministry of Health, Ministry of Trade, Industry and Cooperatives, Ministry of Gender Labor and Social Development, Ministry of Internal Affairs, Ministry of Works and Transport, Ministry of Water and Environment, Ministry of Information, Communications and Technology, and Ministry of Trade, Industry and Cooperatives.

The National Organizing Committee is chaired by the Permanent Secretary Office of the Prime Minister and comprises subcommittees which include; technical subcommittee, the Finance, Logistics and resource mobilization subcommittee, the Transport subcommittee, Exhibitions subcommittee, Accommodation and Welfare subcommittee, Health subcommittee, Accreditation subcommittee, Communications and documentation subcommittee, Security and Protocol subcommittee, Tourism subcommittee, IT subcommittee, VISA subcommittee and Entertainment subcommittee.

The second scoping mission for the **11th Session** of the Africa Regional Forum on Sustainable **Development (ARFSD-11)** was conducted from December 8–13, 2024, in Kampala, Uganda.

This mission, jointly coordinated by the United Nations Economic Commission for Africa (ECA), the Government of Uganda, and the UN Country Team

(UNCT), marked a step in finalizing preparations for the Forum, scheduled to take place in April 2025 at the Speke Resort Munyonyo.

The mission aimed to consolidate logistical and substantive aspects of the Forum, ensuring alignment across stakeholders.

#### Interface Meeting Of The Uganda Gender Consortium On SDGs Hosted By The Uganda NGO Forum

Since 2016, FOWODE has coordinated and convened the Uganda Gender Consortium on SDGs (UGCS), a platform that monitors the components of gender equality in the SDGs at the local, national and regional levels. In partnership with the Office of the Prime Minister (OPM), the work of UGCS directly feeds into the domestication of the 2030 Agenda and Agenda 2063.

A key objective of the meeting was to develop actionable strategies for collaboration ahead of the upcoming 11<sup>th</sup> African Regional Forum on Sustainable Development (ARFSD-11) that Uganda will host.

#### **Post Summit Of The Future Symposium**

The Post-Summit of the Future Symposium was convened on 28th November, 2024 at Onomo Hotel in Kampala by the SDG Secretariat - Office of the Prime Minister in Uganda with support GIZ Civil Society Support Programme (CUSP) which is co-funded by the German Cooperation and the European Union. The aim was to explore ways by which Uganda can align with and localize the principles and action commitments of the Pact within national frameworks and how to strengthen national efforts toward the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The Post-Summit Symposium is strategically designed to build on these commitments by:

- i. Developing actionable strategies for implementing the Pact for the Future across Uganda's key sectors.
- ii. Engaging diverse stakeholders; including government, private sector, development partners, and civil society; to foster inclusive partnerships.

The participants in the Post-Summit of the Future Symposium included; representatives from the Office of the Prime Minister, Key Ministries, Departments, and Agencies (MDAs), Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) and NGOs, Development Partners, Academia and Research Institutions, Private Sector Representatives, Media and Youth.

The Summit for the Future provided a platform for nations to adopt the Pact for the Future, a comprehensive global framework addressing peace, sustainable development, climate change, digital cooperation, human rights, and equity. For Uganda, the summit was an opportunity to reaffirm its alignment with global and regional frameworks, including Vision 2040, the National Development Plans (NDPs), and Agenda 2063, while ensuring the voices of future generations and youth were prioritized. Key outcomes of the Summit, such as the Global Digital Compact, the Declaration on Future Generations, and the New Agenda for Peace, underline Uganda's need to fast-track sustainable development. These frameworks emphasize the need for intergenerational equity, technological innovation, and climate resilience, all of which resonate strongly with Uganda's national priorities. - iii. Defining a monitoring and evaluation framework to assess Uganda's progress toward meeting the Pact's goals.
- iv. Strengthening synergies between the Summit outcomes and existing frameworks such as the Africa Regional Forum on Sustainable Development (ARFSD).

The Uganda Post-Summit Symposium delivered a clear implementation framework for integrating the Pact for the Future into Uganda's development policies. The outcomes will contribute to accelerated poverty eradication, enhanced digital cooperation, and strengthened climate resilience.

The SDG Localization Guidelines 'retreat took place from 26<sup>th</sup> -27<sup>th</sup> November 2024 and was facilitated by a team of resource persons from within the SDG coordination framework. The retreat was supported

by the Center for Conflict Resolution (CECORE). The retreat sessions were inclusive and participatory. Presentations, group work, and sharing of scenarios were used during the retreat.

As a means of enhancing the localization efforts and capacities at the local level, the SDG Secretariat with partners has also developed the SDG Localization Guidelines. The guidelines serve as a roadmap, providing essential steps to secure the commitment of local leaders and actors in the successful implementation of the 2030 Agenda. The guidelines encompass the establishment of structural arrangements at the District/ City, Subcounty/ Division and other lower local government levels,

raising awareness about the SDGs, advocacy for an enabling environment, effective service delivery, and collaborative multi-stakeholder frameworks for monitoring, documentation, and reporting. They are a valuable resource for a wide array of stakeholders, including national Ministries, Departments, and Agencies, Local Governments, the private sector, international organizations, civil society entities, academia, and all those engaged in implementing, monitoring, and reporting on the SDGs.

#### The 2024 Sustainable Development Transformation Forum (SDTF)

Uganda was represented at the 2024 Sustainable Development Transformation Forum (SDTF) Incheon, South Korea organized by the United Nations Office for Sustainable Development (UNOSD).

The 2024 SDTF opened with a reflection on the outcomes of the Summit of the Future and the themes of the 2025 HLPF. framing the Forum within the current international framework and the latest scientific thinking.

#### SDG 15: Stop Deforestation: A Call to Action for Uganda's Sustainable Future



Deforestation has emerged as one of the most critical environmental challenges facing the world. The loss of forests not only depletes biodiversity but also exacerbates climate change impacts and threatens livelihoods, especially those in rural areas who depend on natural resources. This call is not just an environmental imperative, it is central to Uganda's commitments to sustainable development as outlined in the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and Uganda's Vision 2040.

Forests provide vital services, such as carbon sequestration, water regulation, and erosion control. According to Uganda's Third National Voluntary Review (VNR) Report 2024, while the country

















has made some progress in increasing forest cover from 9.5% in 2015 to 13.3%, there is still much work to be done to reach the target of 15% forest cover by 2026. This recovery is fragile, and continued deforestation could quickly reverse the gains made, leading to severe consequences for Uganda's people and environment. Read more via:

#### Sustainable Development is the perfect integration of three faces



Economic growth is a critical driver of innovation, poverty alleviation, and resource generation. However, growth alone cannot equate to sustainability if it depletes natural resources or widens social inequities.

True sustainable economic growth must embrace circular economic principles, where efficiency and the reduction of waste are paramount. For instance, investments in renewable energy and green technologies provide both economic opportunities and environmental benefits. Yet, achieving this requires systems thinking, a holistic approach that views the economy as an embedded subsystem of the planet's finite ecological limits. Economic policies must prioritize inclusive prosperity, ensuring that no one is left behind while fostering innovation that respects planetary boundaries.

Sustainable development is a balanced framework that ensures the needs of the present generation are met without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own.

At the core of sustainable development lies the integration of its three dimensions: economic growth, social inclusion, and environmental sustainability. These "three faces" are not mere parallel goals but interdependent pillars that must operate in harmony to achieve sustainability in its truest sense.

Without the seamless integration of these dimensions, the pursuit of development becomes fragmented, inequitable, and ultimately unsustainable.
